## Northwest Georgia Family Crisis Center, Inc.

The purpose of the NWGFCC is to end violence in the home by providing shelter, advocacy and support to victims while working in the community to change attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors. We have identified the following core values:

- We value every survivor's right to make their own decisions.
- We value every child's right to live in a violence-free home.
- We value every survivor's determination to succeed.
- We value a safe, confidential environment for survivors.
- We value accessibility to survivor driven services.

Domestic violence is defined as violent behavior within the home, typically involving the violent abuse of a spouse or partner. 1 in 3 women have experienced some form of physical violence by an intimate partner. 1 in 15 children are exposed to intimate partner violence each year, and 90% of these children are eyewitnesses to this violence! The Northwest Georgia Family Crisis Center has been serving victims for over 44 years and I am honored to be a volunteer and board member. Our mission is to end violence in the home by providing shelter, advocacy, and support to these victims while working in the community to change attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors.

I began volunteering at the center after a United Way tour at the center over four years ago and was so impressed with how the center was making a difference in the quality of life for the abused women, men, and children in our community! In the four years I have served on the board, I have witnessed firsthand the passion that the center's staff has for fulfilling our mission. Not only are clients given a safe haven, but they are given the tools and resources to move forward and break the cycle.
